Winter Driving Tips



Don't be caught out in the cold this winter season. Prepare for Old Man Winter by following a few of these tips:

Get your Car Ready!

- Always keep the gas tank at least half full. Snow covered roads drive much slower and require more frequent breaking.
- Make sure your wipers are in excellent condition so that visibility is clear while you are on the road.
- Schedule a tune-up with your mechanic to give your car a complete look-over, especially focusing on the tire treads.

- Replenish your emergency supplies. Keep a heavy blanket, window scraper, flashlight, first-aid kit, jumper cables, shovel, flares and some nonperishable snacks handy in the trunk of your car.

Be Aware on the Road!

- Slow down when turning on corners, steering steadily.
- Keep adequate distance between the car in front of you and follow any speed restrictions.
- If you should skid, steer in the direction of the skid.
- Be aware of the traffic moving ahead of you. For example, do not attempt to pass through a green light at an intersection if the cars beyond the light are not moving. Blocking an intersection can be especially dangerous in wintery conditions.

If Only I Thought of that!

- Become familiar with mass transit options.
- Check weather and traffic reports before getting in your car.
- Sign up for KMM's Emergency Traffic Network.
- Log on to www.njcommuter.com for real time traffic updates.
- Allow for extra time when driving to your destination.
- Be alert. Rest if you are too tired to drive.
- Make sure your cell phone is charged and have its charger on hand. If you don't carry a cell phone, carry a few dollars in change.
- Plan an alternate route in case the road you normally take is impassable or congested.

Winterize Your Commute

How do you like snow? Do you rush outdoors when the first snowflake falls? Do you make snow angels? Or, do you maintain a respectful distance, watching the weather through your window as you sip a cup of cocoa in front of a blazing fire?

Snowy, icy roads can turn even those most enamored with Winter into white knuckle drivers. If just the thought of driving in bad weather makes you want to hibernate until Spring, do something about it. Plan ahead. If you live near mass transit, perhaps a bus or train fits your commute plans. Or, find a friend, neighbor or co-worker who is going your way.

KMM's *Winter Emergency Plan* (WEP) provides free ridematching services, mass transit information and traffic alerts to winter-wary commuters. Sign up for the email Emergency Traffic Network using the form on the back page. For real time traffic information, logon to www.njcommuter.com. Benefits of Ridesharing

Many New Jersey commuters who have grown weary of the stress of commuting alone everyday have discovered a more enjoyable way to work through ridesharing. By joining a vanpool or a carpool or taking mass transit, these commuters are able to share driving duties or use their free time on non-driving days to relax and enjoy the ride.

In addition to reduced stress and the ability to relax on the way to work, commuters who rideshare also experience a number of other benefits. Commuters who rideshare are saving money each week both on gas and wear and tear on their cars. Many ridesharing commuters also gain satisfaction from knowing they are doing something to help the environment. By riding together, these commuters are taking vehicles off the road. Less vehicles on the road means less congestion and less pollution, allowing everyone to breathe a little easier.

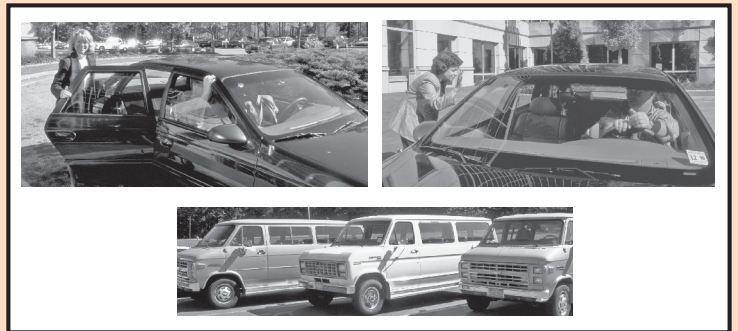
To make ridesharing an even more winning experience, KMM has introduced two programs that provide commuters who rideshare with additional benefits. The Vanpool Empty Seat Subsidy program and the Emergency Ride Home program are free programs available to commuters who have done their part to help reduce congestion by carpooling, vanpooling or taking mass transit.

Commuters both in existing and start-up vanpools are eligible to participate in the Vanpool Empty Seat Subsidy program. This rideshare benefit program is designed to give vanpools a financial boost when they need it, allowing them to stay on the road as long as possible. Vanpools with empty seats that are in danger of disbanding may apply for a \$125 monthly subsidy for a term of up to 3 months. This 3-month

supplement helps defray the monthly costs of the van while members search for new riders.

Commuters who participate in a registered carpool, vanpool, or use mass transit at least once a week are eligible to participate in the Emergency Ride Home program (ERH). The ERH program serves as a safety net for these commuters, ensuring that they will never be stranded at work without a way home. Using program vouchers, ERH members can call for an emergency ride up to 3 times a year in instances of unexpected overtime, a family emergency, a carpool breakdown, or transit service interruption.

These exciting and innovative programs are KMM's way of saying thank you to rideshare commuters for helping to reduce traffic on New Jersey's congested roadways. Middlesex County Creates Department of Transportation

Middlesex County grew by 12% during the last decade of the 20th century. If projections are correct, the County will experience an additional 8% growth rate by 2010. More jobs, more homes, and more people are transforming the environment in Middlesex County and will continue to do so at a rate that exceeds statewide averages.

The demands on the County's transportation system are expected to burgeon in the coming years as workers, aging baby boomers, and people with special needs require more convenient and more frequent transit services. In order to meet the needs of County residents and workers, the Middlesex County Board of Chosen Freeholders has created a Department of Transportation.

The new department consolidates Area Wide Transportation (AWTS) services, operations planning, and vehicle maintenance into one unit. Previously, these functions had spanned 3 departments. Eventually, vehicle storage and maintenance will be consolidated into one location. Division heads of operations and vehicle maintenance now report to the Director of the Department of Transportation.

Freeholder Director David Crabel said, "The consolidation of services and functions will enable Middlesex County to improve our system, reduce downtime, and improve service for residents."

Following a nationwide search, the Freeholder Board selected Steven R. Fittante to be the Director of the Department of Transportation. Fittante holds a Masters Degree in City and Regional Planning from Rutgers University. He has spent 28 years developing and managing transit services in the private and public sectors, including a stint as Director of the Monmouth County Department of Transportation. Most recently, Fittante worked as the Northeast Region Manager for National Express, a company that provides fixed route and para-transit services throughout the United States.

Fittante, who began work on December 13, said, "My professional life has come full circle. I attended school in New Brunswick and began my career in County government. My primary goal is to develop a system that better integrates our statewide public transit system with the specialized transportation services provided by the County in order to meet the rapidly growing demands for suburban passenger transportation."
